In 2011, Governor Corbett cut \$1 billion from state education funding and dismantled the funding formula, making Pennsylvania one of only 3 states that do not use a formula.



Now, school districts are receiving less state funding.

With the amount of state aid received for the 2013-14 academic year, Penn-Delco School District is still:

- ♦ More than \$900 thousand away from 2013-14 adequacy targets
- ◆More than \$600 thousand away from restoring funds back to 2010-2011 levels




State Aid in Penn-Delco

Actual Funding

To cope with state budget cuts, the burden of funding schools has fallen on local communities. During the past three years, many school districts have raised property taxes at least once.



Penn-Delco has increased property taxes about 9% in the past 3 years, the fourth highest increase in Delaware County.

Student Performance Facts


- * Penn-Delco has close to a 10% achievement gap in reading for economically disadvantaged students.
- Penn-Delco graduates more than 95% of its students, the 4th highest graduation rate in Delaware County
- *About 80% of Penn-Delco students performed at or above grade level in reading and math in 2011-2012.

What does the future hold for Penn-Delco School District?

The Governor's 2014-15 budget proposal calls for \$241 million to restore funding for Pennsylvania's schools, most of which will be available through the newly created *Ready to Learn Block Grant*. If the Governor's proposal is adopted by legislature, next year districts will be \$440 million short in state funds compared to 2010-11 funding levels.

Even with the Governor's proposed *Ready to Learn Block Grant* for the 2014-15 academic year, the Penn-Delco School District is still **over \$300 thousand short in state aid** compared to 2010-11 funding levels.
