Philadelphia, PA (March 26th, 2015)- One week after the announcement of the *Pledge for Philadelphia's Children*, four of the six Democratic candidates for Mayor of Philadelphia have signed, committing their future administration to championing the City's children. The pledge includes a specific set of goals to better the lives of Philadelphia's children. The policies the signers commit to include universal high-quality Pre-K access, a higher minimum wage, upgraded City healthcare and recreation facilities, the founding of an Office of Children's Services Integration, expanded participation in childhood hunger prevention programs and a sufficiently funded School District.
